Insight

Janice was in a rush to get to work. It seemed that she was always on the verge of being late. She had to admit that she dawdled in getting out of the house and catching the commuter train.

Today was no different. The train was only about two minutes late getting to her station. Janice read the morning newspaper and sipped her coffee. At the downtown main station, Janice joined all the other commuters in the mad rush to get out of the station and onto the city sidewalks. Church Teaching

By praying this petition, we express absolute trust in our heavenly Father. We believe that God who gives life to his children will also give us the spiritual and material sustenance required for life. Thus the words “give us” in this petition remind us of the Covenant between God and us.

These covenant-driven words also remind us that we have a responsibility to one another. We are called to community in solidarity. In this sense, God gives us what we most need: each other.

Daily Sustenance

The expression “daily bread” refers to material substance—the food and drink—we need for living. We ask God for daily sustenance, not an abundant stockpile of food but sufficient for this day. On another level, this phrase is an allusion to the “day” that centers a believer’s spiritual well-being, the new day of Christ’s Resurrection made present in the Eucharist. So “this day” is not just of mortal time but also the eternal “today” of God. This new day is known to us in Christ’s sacrifice. Indeed, Christ rises for us every day.

Bread Broken for the World

The Eucharist is the true daily bread of believers. And from the Eucharistic celebration we go forth to give generously to others. *We* become bread broken for the world as we feed the hungry and, like leaven, raise up one another into Christ’s kingdom of justice, peace, and love.
