Recall the Easter Vigil

Before we approached the font of new life, we invoked the names of the holy ones who have gone before us in faith and asked for their prayerful intercession before the throne of God.

Probe the Mystery

We cannot do this all on our own. Fortunately, we are blessed to stand within a great company of Saints.

In this household, the household of faith, we rely on others. We stand on the holy ground cultivated by the fidelity of others. Countless men and women of the faith have gone before us. By the example of

their lives—by their holiness—they show us how to hold fast to the things of Heaven even as we are surrounded by the things of Earth.

That is why we ask them to pray for us, to intercede for us before the throne of God. In Heaven, they stand before that throne, thronged in their many ranks of order and harmony, raising their voices to praise the Lord God. Like any good friend, we ask them to put in a “good word” for us. Knowing that they are there for us, our resolve is strengthened; our attitude turns to joyful anticipation, as we hasten along the paths of goodness, right and virtue. “Pray for us,” we implore, “pray for us!”

At that moment during the Litany of Saints, did you feel inspired to live up to the Saints' holy example? Do you *now*?

Savor the Sweetness of Salvation

The names of the Holy Ones roll off of our tongues in a long litany that is consoling, powerful and perhaps even a bit overwhelming. God is glorified in his Saints, for their glory is the crowning of his multiplicity of gifts and graces. In the Saints' lives on Earth, God gives us an example, and in our communion with them in the company of the Church, we are afforded friendship and protection.

Imagine! Our own names could very well end up in this litany one day. Do we not strive for holiness in every area of our lives? We can achieve this goal because others, like us, achieved it. It is doable.
