Pray

Rite of Baptism: Prayer for the Clothing With a Baptismal Garment

Prepare

Prepare the space with chairs, an alb (or the white garment given at the Baptism), a Bible and a baptismal candle. If needed have nametags. Have some refreshments available.

Caution: If the group is larger than five or six, guide people to share in smaller groups whenever possible.

Gather

1. Greet people as they arrive. Take time for introductions and check in with everyone to find out how they are doing.
2. Recall the Easter Vigil when those newly baptized were dressed in a white robe and a candle lit from the new Paschal candle.
3. Discuss what they remember – their thoughts, their feelings as well as where they have kept their baptismal candle.

Deepen

1. With the group, discuss if they have clothes for special occasions such as weddings, Christmas, theater, funerals or other events.
 2. Ask:
 - *What do the clothes indicate?*
 - *How does it feel to wear these clothes?*
 - *Where do you keep these clothes?*
 - *So wearing certain clothes means...*
 3. Read and discuss the *Probe the Mystery* section of the participant page.
 - What does it mean to “put on” the white robe?
 4. Proclaim the Book of Revelation, Chapter 7
 - So being dressed in white means...
- Summarize the discussion

Meditate

1. If possible, visit the sacristy to see the white robes (albs) of the priest, deacon, and the altar servers, if it is your parish practice that the altar servers wear white.
2. Refer to the *Savor the Sweetness of Salvation* section of the participant page.
3. Explore with these points:
 - Every person who is baptized wears the white robe; they are a new person, a child of God.
 - In our Catholic tradition, a person is baptized only once; Baptism is forever. It cannot be undone; once baptized, always baptized.

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- In Baptism, we are wrapped in God's grace. We are gifted with the Holy Spirit; thus the gifts of wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear (awe) of God are bestowed on us.

Discuss each of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit.

- An understanding of what the gift is
- Examples of the impact of the gift in one's life
- Ways that we can expand and deepen our use of the gift

Summarize the discussion.

Do

1. Invite one or two members of the parish to relate to the group examples of how they live out their understanding of Baptism in their home and/or workplace.
2. Allow some time for discussion.
3. Refer to the *Inspire Others* section of the participant handout.

Pray
