God's Story

In the New Testament of the Bible Mary is described as the mother of Jesus. When she was pregnant with Jesus, Mary traveled to see her cousin Elizabeth. When Elizabeth saw Mary she called her “the mother of my Lord.”

We believe in the Incarnation. This means that we believe that Jesus became human. He was born of the Virgin Mary, and he is like us in all things but sin. Jesus is also God, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity. This is why Mary is also called the Mother of God.

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821)

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton was the first person born in the United States who was named a Saint. Elizabeth and her husband, William, were the parents of five children. They showed God's love to each other and to their children. After William died, Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton founded the Sisters of Charity, the first religious community of women in the United States. Guided by the Holy Spirit, the sisters devoted themselves to working in schools, orphanages, and hospitals. The Church celebrates the Feast of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton on January 4.
