Purification and Enlightenment Session CATECHIST APPRENTICES IN FAITH: First Sunday of Lent

Catechist Preparation

FIRST READING—DEUTERONOMY 26:4-10

This is a pivotal passage in the Old Testament, with the credal statement contained here recalling how God marks Israel with his special favor in the events of its history. The people express their acknowledgment of God's election of them, which is at the center of their existence. Israel's own understanding regarding its election was not based on pride or merit but on the repeated experience of God's fidelity.

SECOND READING—ROMANS 10:8-13

This portion of Saint Paul's letter is thought to derive from an early Christian confession of faith. It emphasizes belief in the heart as well as witnessing : to faith. What the children of Israel found in the old Covenant, Christians find in the person of Christ.

Gospel-Luke 4:1-13

Considered against its Jewish background, this scriptural episode shows how Jesus succeeds in his desert experience versus the Israelite experience of being tested or tempted in the desert. Israel came up against physical hunger, the lure of idolatry, and the desire to test God. Jesus responds to these same temptations out of his deep fidelity to God. He reverses the human unfaithfulness that has ever been part of the story of God's dealing with those whom he chooses. Jesus becomes the exemplar of the right response to God's election.

2. Invite the participants to share their observations about the environment of the church during Lent. Ask: What does the environment say about the importance of the Lenten season?

Enhance

Invite the participants to consider the following questions quietly. Some might want to write their responses on a piece of paper or in a journal:

:What is the Lord asking of you this Lent?

In what way do you experience temptation, and how do you respond to it?

How is this Liturgy of the Word leading you more deeply into Lent?

- 2. After a few moments of silent reflection, invite several volunteers to share their responses to the last question.
- 3. Use these points to summarize:
 - Lent is a time of spiritual recollection to prepare for initiation into the Church and, in particular, the baptismal renunciations and promises.
- Lent is a time to sort out what in our lives leads us into a deeper relationship with God and what leads us away from God.

Use the Prayer of Exorcism from the OCIA text (#94F).



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Respond

Invites the elect to identify what resonates with them from the Liturgy of the Word.

Enhance

Encourages the elect to reflect on and name initial insights from the Liturgy of the Word.

Pray

Concludes the Dismissal Session with prayer.

Dismissal Session

Offers a simple, consistent format that gives the catechist tools to facilitate a gathering with the elect after they are dismissed from the Liturgy of the Word.

Extended Catechesis Session .

Guides the catechist in leading the extended sharing, which takes place among catechumens after the Sunday Mass or later in the week.

Welcome

Reminds the catechist to gather everyone in an atmosphere of hospitality and warmth.

Uncover

Offers ideas to ground the participants in their experience of liturgy.

Purify

Helps the catechist lead the elect in a deepening of their self-searching and repentance based on the Sunday liturgy.

Enlighten

Offers points of reflection on Church teaching and key images and symbols of the season.

Purification and Enlightenment Session

Extended Catechesis Session

(Approximately 45 to 60 minutes)

Deuteronomy 26:4-10 Psalm 91:1-2, 10-15 Romans 10:8-13 Luke 4:1-13

Begin by welcoming everyone who is present, including godparents, sponsors, team members, and spouses who are joining the group. .

- 1. Proclaim the First Reading (Deuteronomy 26:4-10).
- 2. Ask the following questions and invite the participants to reflect on them quietly before sharing their responses with one or two other people:

What does this reading proclaim about who God is and what God desires for all of us?

What does it tells us about the Israelites and their relationship with God?

What does it tell us about our need to give thanks and praise to God for our many blessings?

- Read or summarize Repent on the participant handout, and allow time for reflection and discussion of the For Reflection questions.
- 2. Use the Responsorial Psalm from today's liturgy as a meditation. You may wish to invite everyone to close their eyes while you read aloud the verses of the Psalm in a slow, reflective style, pausing
- 3. After some silence, invite the participants to share their responses to these questions:

What word or phrase stays with you?

What is the message of this Psalm?

In what way is the Lord your refuge and fortress? When might you pray the refrain: "Be with me, Lord"?

Live:

- . Summarize or invite the participants to read the remaining sections of the participant handout and reflect on the questions. Then discuss the following points:
 - With God's grace, we can confront sin in our lives.
 - Acknowledging sin is a necessary step to holiness
 - Conversion means to turn away from sin and to be faithful to Christ and the Gospel. The whole season of Lent is focused on the need for conversion. Conversion is a lifelong pursuit of God and the way of the Gospel.
 - In Baptism we die to sin but live for God in
 - 2. Highlight the Key Images and Symbols of the Season section.

- 1. The Scriptures give us clues about having a right relationship with God, others, and all created things. To foster these right relationships, we are encouraged to make use of the three Lenten practices: prayer, works of charity (almsgiving), and fasting. Encourage the participants to discuss these practices and share some practical examples
 - 2. Allow some quiet for the participants to consider what aspects of these three Lenten practices they will focus on during Lent this year.
 - 3. Invite the participants to reflect on the questions in Preparing for Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. If there is time, encourage volunteers to share their reflections.

Invite the participants to gather around the table on which you have placed the sand and crucifix. Conclude by praying together the prayer from the participant handout.

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Encourages the participants to integrate learning into their daily lives.
