Church Teaching

The Heart of the Matter

Faith has a certain content and therefore a vocabulary. We can talk about it, learn of it, and share our understanding of it intelligibly. It is knowledge to be received, contemplated, probed for its significance, and lived. But at the heart of our faith is the Person of Jesus of Nazareth. Uniquely and perfectly, he is the Only Begotten **Son of God.** He became one of us without losing his divinity and lived among us. He is true God and true man.

Saying yes to Jesus means saying yes to him as the one person who accomplishes what none of us alone or together can do. He alone is **Savior** (the name *Jesus* means "God saves")—he delivers us from the power of evil and rescues us from sinfulness (see Acts 4:12). He alone is **Messiah**—the "anointed" Suffering Servant promised by God to fulfill the messianic hope of Israel (see Matthew 20:28). He alone is **Lord**—who shows his divine sovereign power over nature, demons, sin, and even death by his Resurrection. To him belongs the power, glory, and honor of God (see Philippians 2:9).

Savior, Teacher, and Guide

Jesus Christ, the Son of God, became incarnate in the womb of the Virgin Mary through the power of the Holy Spirit for us and for our Salvation. Jesus is the source of our Salvation, and he is the fullness of the Revelation of God. Divine love shines forth from him, teaches us, and guides us.

In Jesus, we are made sharers in that divine love, conformed to that love, and motivated by it to work on behalf of the Kingdom of God. Jesus makes us better than we could ever be on our own.
