Insight

Six months ago Debbie's son Sammy had no strength, was constantly in and out of the hospital, and was resigned to going on dialysis—that is, until a compatible kidney became available. The transplant went smoothly. Sammy's body accepted the donor kidney.

Debbie reflected on how this wonderful gift completely turned around Sammy's condition. He had his appetite again, his strength, and most of all, hope for the future.

This was the case for not only Sammy, however. The whole family was given a boost. Debbie could tell things were much better. The children were arguing again like healthy, normal kids, and not tiptoeing around quietly. Hope filled the family.
