
sacraments

Saint Ambrose (339-397)

Ambrose was a very wise man who became a lawyer and was the governor of Milan in Italy. In the year 374 the bishop of Milan died, and the people wanted Ambrose to be named the bishop. He was not even a priest! Even more, he had never been taught Christian beliefs and had never been baptized. So within a week Ambrose was baptized, ordained a priest, and named the bishop of Milan. He gave away his riches and possessions and began to study Scripture and theology. He used his wisdom and his position to speak up for justice. The Church celebrates the Feast of Saint Ambrose on December 7.
